Overview of the Holt Fund


Overview of the Holt Fund

- Established in 2000 at the instruction of Edna Louise Holt; named for herself and her sister Fanny Holt Ames
- The sisters were longtime residents of Grafton, Vermont
- The Fund was structured to meet the medical needs of Grafton and surrounding towns with primary consideration to Grace Cottage Hospital
- Funding and resources seek to meet the medical needs of individuals in these towns, with priority for those with limited access to health resources
- Distributed over \$18.7M since inception

Guiding Principles

Funding available to nonprofit organizations Grants are awarded based upon the needs of the communities, as identified through a competitive application process administered annually

The Fund seeks to focus its resources on efforts that will have a positive and lasting impact on the largest number of people

- -Capital support


Housing Initiative

- -Two-stage process (Concept Paper and select organizations invited to submit a full proposal)
- -\$100,000 per year for up to 3 years

TRADITIONAL GRANTS



TYPES OF HEALTH NEEDS ACTIVITIES

- Chronic, acute and long-term care services
- Diagnostic screening
- Emergency medical services
- Community-based prevention and health promotion activities
- Treatment
- Health education efforts
- Social determinants of health

"Conditions in the places where people live, learn, work, and play that affect a wide range of health and quality-of life-risks and outcomes" - CDC

Categories of Potential Grants

Seek to address health disparities and inequities within the Holt service area

Improve access to care, particularly for vulnerable populations

Focus on prevention,
health education,
intervention,
treatment, evaluation,
and a personalized
approach to care

Builds the organization capacity of individual agencies or collaboratives that better provide health and medical services

TRADITIONAL GRANT CATEGORIES



SMALL GRANTS

Up to \$15,000

Single-year

Discrete projects or programmatic expenses



LARGE GRANTS

More than \$15,000

Single or multi-year (up to 3 years)

Program or project support

Operating expenses (if operating budget< \$1M)

Capital support

HOUSING AS A DETERMINANT OF HEALTH



- In response to community input and demonstrated need, the Holt Fund launched the Housing Initiative in 2019 and has since invested just over \$400,000 across five multi-year projects.
- Three-pronged emphasis:
 - The physical conditions within homes
 - Conditions in the neighborhoods surrounding homes
 - Housing affordability
- Need for multi-faceted strategies

HOLT REVIEW PROCESS AND CRITERIA



OVERALL REVIEW CRITERIA



Adherence to the Holt Fund's mission



Significance of need



Evidence of feasible methodology or approach, and appropriate to proposal's goals



Ability of applicant to measure impact of grant funds on proposed need



Evidence that outcomes are well-conceived, realistic, and measurable



Ability to demonstrate sufficient experience and capacity to conduct program/project



Use of collaborative approaches, as appropriate



Likelihood of lasting impact on need of population (large grants and housing initiative)



Ability to sustain the program/project once Holt funding ends (large grants and housing initiative)

DISTRIBUTION REVIEW COMMITTEE'S (DRC) PROCESS

- Committee is comprised of people
 who live and/or work in Grafton
 and surrounding communities, or
 have deep knowledge of the Fund's
 priorities
- Provide input and recommendation to Trustee
- All proposals are reviewed by several members
