Ana Maria De La Rosa (she/ella) Managing Director of the RWJF Culture of Health Prize

Ana Maria De La Rosa is a Managing Director of Healthy & Equitable Communities at HRiA. Ms. De La Rosa's career is rooted in supporting historically oppressed and marginalized communities through grantmaking, organizing, technical assistance, and capacity building. Her previous experience ranges from supporting localized farmworker movements, national immigration policy campaigns, and international climate justice advocacy. She has a BA in Political Science and International Global Studies and a public health graduate degree in Health Advocacy from Sarah Lawrence College.



Heidi Klein (she/her) Managing Director of the RWJF Culture of Health Prize

Heidi Klein is a Managing Director of Healthy and Equitable Communities at HRiA. Ms. Klein brings 30+ years of strategic public health leadership working with leaders at the national, state, and local levels to create healthy and equitable communities through public policy, cross-sector engagement, and community action. Her practice focuses on leading governmental innovation, guiding complex systems change, facilitating cross-sector dialogue [that brings together quantitative data with community voices and values], and building

multidisciplinary teams that can navigate through uncertainty. Centering community voices to advance health equity and creating accountability structures in governmental agencies and health care systems has been fundamental in this work. Ms. Klein most recently served 10 years as Director of Planning for the Vermont Department of Health, including 2 years as

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Operations Director and Health Equity Advisor in leading the state COVID-19 response. Previously she worked with a variety of state and national leaders including the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO), Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO), American Public Health Association (APHA), Association of Public Health Laboratories (APHL), and National Network of Public Health Institutes (NNPHI). She is a founder of both the Vermont Public Health Association (VtPHA) and the Vermont Public Health Institute (VtPHI). Ms. Klein received her master's degree in public health at University of Massachusetts, Amherst and her BA in Cultural Anthropology at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

Claire de Leon (she/hers) Vice President

Claire lives and breathes effective messaging to inspire liberation. Claire's work spans reproductive justice, technology justice, and health equity. She is the chair of the Leadership Conferences' Civil Rights and Technology Table's repro x tech working group, born of this communications guide she led development of. Claire is a trained health educator with a masters in public health where she focused on Black maternal health and birth justice. She is a seasoned communications professional who has collaborated with hundreds of organizations, advocates, and movement leaders

to share stories that build political will for social and racial justice. Claire draws from 15 years of



communications experience, including directing communications for UCSF's statewide California preterm birth initiative.



Kristiana Jordan (she/hers) Director

Kristiana uses her communications expertise to connect the dots across issues areas and perspectives in her justice-focused work. She provides media relations, campaign, research, and messaging support to clients working on everything from privacy and surveillance to discrimination against Black hair. At the Massachusetts State Senate Kristiana focused on stakeholder engagement and translated legal jargon into layman's terms for bill summaries. An abortion doula in training, Kristiana worked closely with Claire to develop a

communications guide focused on the intersection of tech surveillance and abortion criminalization. She also led communications around the criminalization of pregnancy outcomes while working at Color Of Change.

Ellie brings nearly two decades of experience in strategic communication, digital strategy, coalition management, and advocacy communication to Spitfire. She helps organizations craft strategic digital communication to achieve their policy objectives and enhance their advocacy campaigns. She applied her digital chops to supporting Just Label It, a campaign to pressure big food companies to support mandatory labeling of GMOs. Ellie trains numerous organizations on digital strategy and implementation, including grantees of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation

(RWJF), Office of Adolescent Health and Blank Foundation, participants in Spitfire's Executive Training Program, and local partner organizations of the United Way and the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities. Ellie partnered with the Lown Institute to create messages to describe its important work transforming the health system in the U.S. Before joining Spitfire, Ellie directed advocacy and voter engagement campaigns with National Council of La Raza (now UnidosUS) Affiliates and the organization's digital activist network on national campaigns to advance immigration reform, fair housing practices, and health care reform.

Karley helps companies and nonprofits find their voice and tell their story. She has led communications departments, worked within nonprofits and advised corporate departments. With a background in journalism, Karley enjoys helping clients identify a media hook and develop compelling messages. There, Karley led a full-scale marketing campaign for a neighborhood in Arlington, Virginia struggling during the COVID-19 outbreak, using earned media, paid advertising

and digital strategies. While at the Environmental Defense Fund (EDF), Karley led communications for the sustainable Supply Chain team and served as the main media contact. Karley managed communications for EDF Climate Corps, a fellowship program that trains and matches graduate students with host companies to complete projects on renewable energy, ESG reporting and exploring innovative sustainability solutions. 
