



1. Is a single nonprofit eligible to apply for both Traditional and Housing grants if they are for distinctly different programs?

Yes, a nonprofit organization can apply for both Traditional and Housing Initiative grants because these are two different categories, and as long as they are for distinctly different programs or initiatives.

2. Is a current recipient of a Traditional multi-year grant eligible to apply for a one-year (Traditional small) grant?

No, current applicants of a Traditional grant may not apply for the other type of Traditional grant (e.g., if you have a Traditional Large Grant, you may not apply for a Traditional Small Grant and vice versa). You may only apply for the other grant category depending on what your existing grant is. For example, if you are receiving a Traditional multi-year grant, you may still apply for a Housing Initiative grant, and vice versa.

3. What are some examples of projects under each grant category: Traditional and Housing?

4. Can organizations partner with other initiatives that may have more experience in a certain area?

Yes, we encourage partnerships where possible and with other organizations that can help you achieve your goals and carry out activities. There is a question around partnerships in the applications for both grant categories.

5. What do you see as the greatest need in the communities served by the Holt Fund?

The Holt Fund doesn't tend to be prescriptive with the approaches that organizations include in their applications. Rather, we look to you to share with us and define the needs that exist in your communities, and to propose approaches and activities that would address those needs in the Holt catchment area. Generally, in recent years, we've seen an increase in behavioral health needs. Past funding history also captures a wide variety of areas including chronic illness, housing, transportation, food access and more.



6. How does the Holt Fund measure long-term impact?

We primarily look to organizations to share with us how they measure impact, and we do not limit an organizations' preferred method of measurement. Towards the end of an awardee's funding cycle, we ask a specific set of questions in regular reporting for data collection purposes.
